This is where you'll begin to type your essay. Notice that we haven't added any extra space below the title, and that the first line of each new paragraph will be indented. Normally, you won't be using information from your research in the first paragraph, so you shouldn't have to worry about using any in-text citations in this part of the essay. You'll end this paragraph with a clear thesis statement – often one which includes one, two, or three points you want to explore in the essay.

This is where you'll begin your first body paragraph, with an interesting topic sentence that your teacher will love. Most often this

In-Text Citations

In APA format, every in-text citation includes the same two or three things, and each should be separated by a comma:

- A. Whatever appears first in the Reference page entry (usually an author last name, sometimes an article title or organization name).
- B. Year published
- C. Page Number (if available)

Whenever you quote, paraphrase, or summarize information from a website, article, or book, you should include an in-text citation.

Source with a date and page numbers	(Weir, 2011, p.154)
Source with no date or page numbers	(Mandal, n.d.)
Source with marked paragraph numbers	(Kolb, 1986, para. 6)
Source with no author <i>(use whatever's first in the References entry, usually a title)</i>	(Nature Publishing Group, 2016)
Source with 2 authors	(Robinson & Aronica, 2015, p. 86)
Source with 3-5 authors	(Miller, Choi, & Rubin, 2016) <i>(1st time)</i> (Miller, et al., 2016) <i>(afterwards)</i>
Source with 6+ authors	(Miller et al., 2016)

Variations on in-text citation (direct quote):

Weir (2011) makes it a point by stating “Yes, of course duct tape works in a near-vacuum. Duct tape works anywhere. Duct tape is magic and should be worshiped. ” **(p. 154)**, again connecting technical details with realism and humor.

Miscellaneous References

Interview, email and other personal communication *only cite in-text, don't list on reference page unless told to do so.	First initial Last name, personal Interview, Month Day, year of interview. EXAMPLE of In-text: Your paraphrase or quote from A. Mocny (A. Mocny, personal interview, April 21, 2016).
